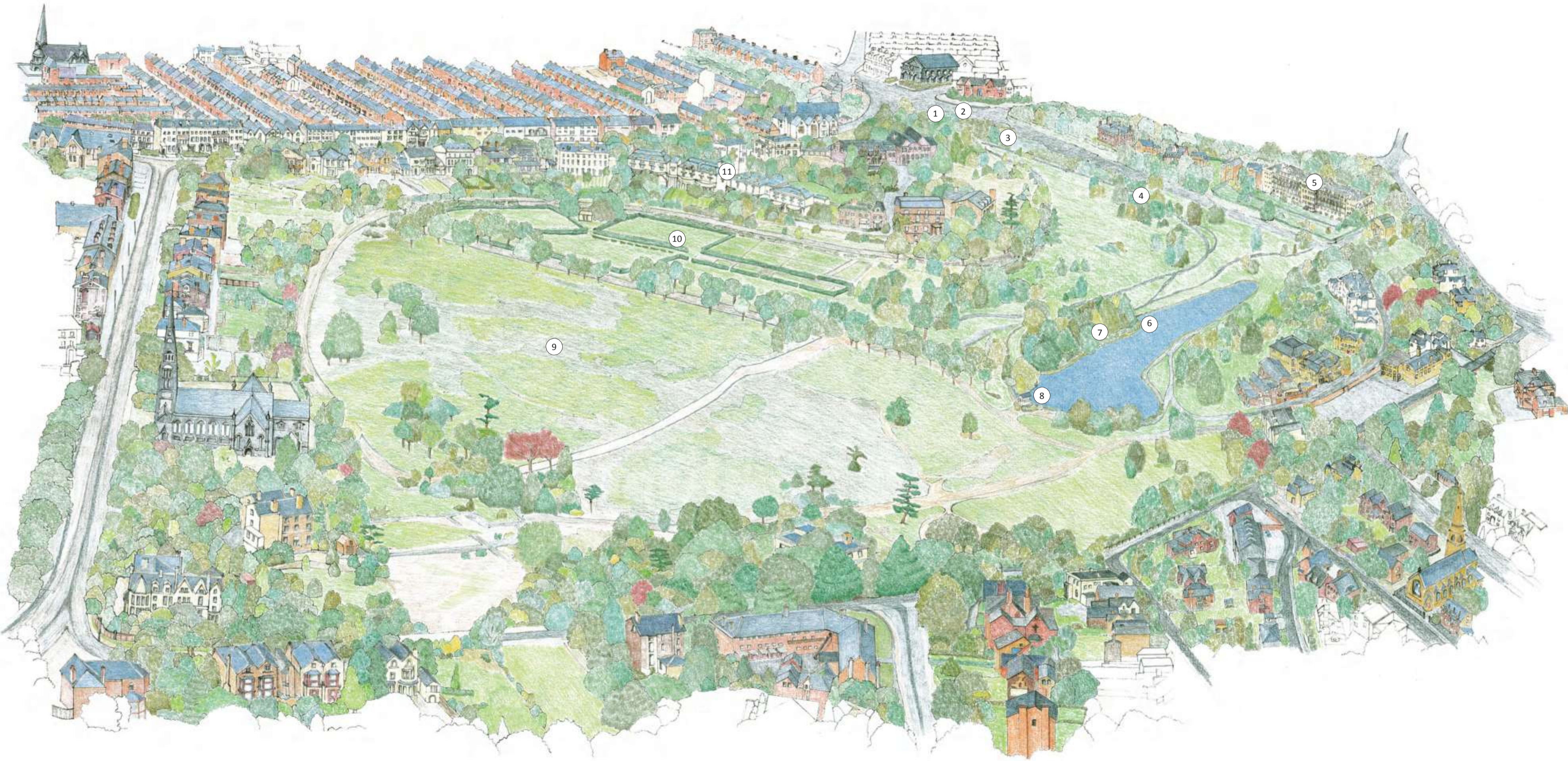


Princes Park, Liverpool

Situated to the south of the city centre and neighbouring Sefton Park, Princes Park represents a significant moment in the British parks movement of the nineteenth century. Opened officially in 1842, it contained one of the first substantial tracts of land to be laid out and protected for public use. Although enemy bombing during the Second World War and vandalism in the decades that followed led to the destruction of some of its features, it remains a site of both historical and contemporary significance.
